

We are so very proud of the accomplishments that we, together with our community have been able to achieve over the past year. To name a few:

- 27 children and youth realized permanency through adoption and 17 are in placements awaiting finalization
- 116 children and youth were placed with family (kin) or with someone they have a close connection to

We strongly believe that providing effective services and programs to children, youth and families is the key to long term sustainable success. We are always seeking partnerships to ensure that happens.

We are constantly humbled by their teachings and wisdom. We recognize that we must do better by Indigenous children, youth and families, we are fully committed to doing just that. As of March 31, 2018 the Society reached over 80% compliance among 14 of the 19 provincial Quality Improvement Plan indicators related to the child welfare standards, 9 of which reached 100% compliance.

The Society achieved compliance ratings above the provincial average among 13 of the 19 indicators, scoring on average 17% higher than the provincial average for Child Welfare Standards.

The Society has achieved 100% compliance consistently for the last 3 quarters on 12 hour and 7 day response times for Investigations, Completed Investigations, and Completed Safety Assessments.

S.T.E.P.S. PROGRAM

The S.T.E.P.S. program (Supervised Teaching of Effective Parenting Skills) is an intensive supervised access program. The program is offered in a home based environment, providing a realistic setting for parents and children. Children in foster care attend the home with their parents for an eight week period for a total of twenty-five hours per week.

There is no doubt that volunteers are invaluable members of the team.





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YOUTH JUSTICE

The Near North Youth Centre (NNYC) is a ten-bed gender-specific female program serving young females aged 12-17 years who have become involved with the law.

The Centre provides secure custody and detention services that contribute to safe communities and provide young people with rehabilitative and re-integration programs and services

The Community Support Team (CST) provides support and guidance to high risk youth between 12 and 17 years of age at the time of the offence. The program works in collaboration with our community partners to ensure that every youth has the best opportunity to succeed and reach his/her potential.

EARLY INTERVENTION SERVICES

The Society offers three distinct family based services to the community of Nipissing through funding with the Public Health Agency of Canada (Community Action Program for Children and the Canada Prenatal Nutrition Program) and the Ministry of Child and Youth Services (Infant and Child Development Services).

The Community Action Program for Children provides professional home visiting support and

resources to parents under the age of 22 that focuses on prenatal care, child development, health, nutrition, education, and family well-being.

The Canada Prenatal Nutrition Program is referred to in our community as Mothercare. Programs for women who are expecting as a platform for learning about prenatal care and nutrition while having access to a registered nurse and social worker.



A community adoption support group, "Cherished Memories" meets monthly. The support group plans to develop a youth support group in the months ahead. Our agency hosts a Wendy's Wonderful Kids Adoption Recruiter; The WWK recruiter implements the Foundation's proactive Child-Focused Recruitment Model targeted exclusively on moving our longest-waiting youth from foster care into adoptive families.

All donations remain local and are dropped off to sponsored families before Christmas morning.


