AND WHAT A YEAR IT'S BEEN

2020-21 is a year that we can safely say is unparalleled in the history of the Children's Aid Society of the district of Nipissing and Parry Sound. As we transitioned from 2019-20 having been introduced to COVID-19, a worldwide pandemic, no one could have imagined the scope of what people would be facing more than one year later. We know that many individuals were and continue to be negatively impacted by this pandemic and tragically many lives were lost.

Although the world was able to isolate to minimize contact with others in the midst of this pandemic, this was never an option for those working in this organization. We mobilized immediately to ensure that the protection and safety of children and youth, their well being and that of their families, was never compromised. Employees at all levels went above and beyond, working tirelessly to provide consistent, seamless, and responsive programs and services, often being the only service providers responding in-person to the complex needs of our communities.

We'd like to extend our congratulations to Niijaansinaanik Child and Family Services who received its designation on April 1, 2021. We have learned a great deal over the last few years, working with you towards devolution. It is definitely a step in the right direction, long overdue, but there is still much to learn and much to do. As we uncover more about the travesty that is the residential school system, it is our ongoing individual and collective responsibility to not only listen, but to take the time to understand the history and the extreme trauma that Indigenous peoples have experienced over many generations.

AND WHAT A YEAR IT'S BEEN CONT'

As a sector we continue to grow and redesign child welfare. Facilitating a robust internal and external engagement process, the Agency unveiled its new 5 year Strategic Plan, outlining the following priorities:

- Actioning Truth and Reconciliation
- Cultivating the vision of modern service systems
- Prioritizing a healthy workplace culture
- Driving targeted and strategic communications
- Leading with excellence and innovation

The Society is incredibly proud to announce the opening of Arbour House, a 60 to 90 day, 8 bed crisis and stabilization residence for youth 12-18 years of age. It is an accomplishment we are extremely proud of, one that we have advocated for and could only dream of for many years, until now. This residence, a much-needed resource, is viewed as a "prototype" by the government and holds a focus of serving youth from the North. We are one step closer to keeping our children close to home, where they belong! We would like to thank the ministry for their ongoing support and we would like to extend our deepest appreciation to MPP Vic Fedeli for his ongoing advocacy for those living in the north, and for his faith in the work of this organization.

Thank you to all of the outstanding employees of the Children's Aid Society of the district of Nipissing and Parry Sound. You have remained steadfast in your determination to meet the needs of children, youth and families, regardless of what obstacles lay before you. Your creativity in doing so is inspiring. We are also extremely grateful to the remarkable board members that govern this organization. They are involved and engaged and always committed to advancing the priorities of the organization to ensure consistent service excellence. As always we look forward to what awaits us.





What is Mothercare?

MotherCare Nipissing is a weekly drop-in program delivered through the Canadian Prenatal Nutrition Program (CPNP). Created in 1994, CPNP provides funding to community groups to help improve the health of pregnant women, new mothers and their babies who face challenges that put their health at risk, such as poverty, teen pregnancy, social and geographic isolation, substance use, and family violence (Public Health Agency of Canada, 2021). The program's specific goals include:

To improve the health of women and their babies by increasing the number of babies born at a healthy weight and promoting and supporting breastfeeding;

To promote and create partnerships within communities to strengthen community capacity and increase support for vulnerable pregnant women and new mothers;

To ensure culturally sensitive prenatal support for Indigenous women and recent immigrants (Public Health Agency of Canada, 2021)

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The Agency's **Itty Bitty Kindness Committee** is focused on promoting a culture of kindness in our community:

- \$2,025.00 raised by walking 30+ kms for Gathering Place Coldest Night of the Year
- 25 Staff participated in Earth Day Clean Up
- 1,210 pounds of non-perishables and \$640.00 donated to the North Bay Food Bank

The Joy Project, our community Christmas campaign matches sponsors to children in care by providing them with a personalized wish list. Thanks to our community, McDonald's and 101.9 FM The Rock for their continued support.

This year **140 children** and **175 families** were matched and over **\$25,000** was collected in monetary donations.

Purple pumpkins were also delivered to Community Partners.










DEVOLUTION

WHEN ONE DOOR CLOSES, A HOUSE OPENS

With the closure of the Near North Youth Centre in October 2020 the concept of **Arbour House** was brought to life. Set to open later this year, Arbour House is an eight-bed licensed children's residence located in North Bay, ON. Our program ensures children remain in the North by offering short-term crisis and stabilization placements which specialize in trauma informed programming for youth between the ages of 12 and 18.





"All Roads Lead Home"

Our Service Model represents a truly trauma informed approach with the goal of temporary placements (60-90 days). Planning focuses on reintegration to a family setting.
